October 4: "When Death Gets Personal," a podcast presented by Michael Dowd and Connie Barlow

Connie Barlow was scheduled to be our guest speaker for our Sunday October 4 service, and her husband, Michael Dowd, was scheduled to present his "Thank God for Evolution" program at LCUUC that afternoon. We learned in late August of Michael's medical diagnosis which will prevent them from coming to LCUUC. Connie and Michael have lived the last 7+ years entirely on the road evangelizing a sacred understanding of the Epic of Evolution. With Michael's life-threatening illness, they have decided to change their mode of operation to sending out podcasts from their website (<http://www.thegreatstory.org/>). Michael and Connie have both written and spoken about how an evolutionary understanding of death can enhance one's gratitude and awareness of the blessings of each moment—and for the generations of ancestors who came before. Our October 4 service will feature their first podcast since Michael's diagnosis, where the two talk about how these conceptual understandings actually do bear fruit in times of need, when death gets personal.

October 11: "Together We Stand: Association Sunday," presented by Rev. Jane Esbensen

Annually, UU congregations around the nation are encouraged by the UUA in Boston to participate in Association Sunday. The theme chosen for this year is Growth in Diversity. The contributions each congregation collects will go toward this theme, a focus on making our vision of justice and equality a reality for all. Come and learn more about this vital and vibrant endeavor to create change for the world we wish to live in.

October 18: "Where Two Or More Are Gathered....", presented by Rev. Jane Esbensen

Today you are invited to learn more about what it means to be part of a congregation of believers. It is not just the minister who ministers in a church, it is all of us. Shared Ministry is what we do whenever we come together to do good works. By these acts we express our individual beliefs and demonstrate the vision of this church community. Please come on this Sunday wearing your heart on your sleeve.

October 25: "Intellectual Integrity: the Life of Joseph Priestley," presented by Rev. Scott Gerard Prinster

How do we remain true to our beliefs when it seems that everyone around us is compromising theirs? One place we can turn for guidance is an important part of our UU history, the story of Joseph Priestley, scientist, theologian, philosopher, and one of the founders of the English Unitarian Church. Journeying: One Minister's Thoughts

Children's Religious Education News

Our classrooms are bustling with energy and enthusiasm as our RE year is under way! Our youngest class is enjoying exploring the web of life, our 3rd to 5th graders have been learning about the lessons of life that can be learned from sports and games, and our older youth started the year off with a focus on team building.

On September 27, our middle schoolers and high schoolers experienced a morning of fun, engaging activities to help them get to know each other and to help build a community atmosphere of inclusion, cooperation, communication, and trust. The groups did challenges – some were physical in nature and others were more cognitive and involved group problem solving, communication, and creative use of resources. All the activities were fun and thought-provoking. There was also time to process the experience and what it taught the groups about teamwork, trust, and community. Many thanks to Lis T, Liz K, and Terry C for facilitating this session for our kids!

It is always exciting to see the old and new friendships unfolding here at LCUUC. Please be sure to bring your children regularly so they can receive the benefit of all the great learning and exchange happening in our classrooms. Here are few things to keep in mind:

Our K-4 to 2nd grade class will be going outside every week (unless there's lightening or bitter cold). Please dress these children for the weather conditions!

Our 3rd to 5th grade class has a curriculum focusing on UU Identity. Some of their sessions recommend a visitor from the congregation who has a specialty to share. We would love a visit from people engaged in the following:

Sports – A player, fan, or coach of a sport
Medicine – an EMT, doctor, nurse, or firefighter
Food – a chef, restaurant owner, orchardist, gardener, or farmer
Science – A scientist (geologist, chemist, physicist, archeologist, etc.)
Building – an architect, engineer, sculptor, woodworker, potter
Exploring – A mountaineer, scuba diver, map maker, world traveler
Web of Life – a veterinarian, wildlife biologist, farmer, equestrian, forest ranger, biologist

If you would be willing to come into our classroom one Sunday, please let Kerry Duma know.

Our middle school class is studying "Neighboring Faiths" this year. This program includes field trips to area houses of worship and can include a trip to Chicago. There will be a Parent Orientation on Sunday, October 11 after the service for parents of middle schoolers to orient them to the program and invite their participation. Parents' input will be sought as to which religious communities to visit and why. Please bring your calendars!

The middle schoolers and any others exploring World Religions will be attending a service at Congregation Emanu-el in Waukesha on Friday evening, October 16. Details will be announced in the Order of Service.

Writing as Spiritual Practice – Sort Of

Like doing yoga or practicing meditation, spending time at the page can help us gain insights into the universe and ourselves. But we need not write about "spiritual" topics in order to receive spiritual outcomes. The simple act of putting pen to paper (or even fingertips to keyboard) has the potential to surprise, delight, and inspire us.

Join this writing-practice group to see what truths your writing can reveal to you. Each session will begin with some words about the art and craft of writing followed by an exercise designed to get us ready for an extended period of writing time. We will finish the evening with a guided reflection about our writing.

This is a 4-week high school and adult offering held at the church. It is not a writing critique or writing therapy group, and participants are not expected to read their writing aloud. We do suggest that those signing up be able to attend at least 3 of the 4 meetings. Members of the spring writing group are warmly encouraged to attend.

The group will meet Thursdays from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. on Oct. 1, 8, 15, and 22. It is facilitated by Kim S and Joanne N. Please email or contact Joanne to sign up.

Ongoing Buddhist Meditation

Every Tuesday morning from 8 to 9:15 a.m., LCUUC offers Tibetan Buddhist meditation. The group meets in the sanctuary. All church members and friends are welcome to participate. You may join the group at any time.

Each weekly session includes a short discussion of basic Buddhist principles followed by a guided Green Wisdom Light meditation. Green Wisdom Light meditation emphasizes the compassion practices of Mahayana Buddhism (www.white-conch.org). Terrific Tuesdays

Tuesday evening meditation continues with Dr. Paul Norton of the Order of Interbeing. We are slowly reading through the book *Wherever You Go There You Are* by Jon Kabat-Zinn. Paul will meet with us the fourth week of each month. We will also have a lay-led meditation session on the second Tuesday of the month. All sessions will be from 7 to 9 p.m. On the fourth Tuesday, Paul will offer instruction in meditation from 6:30 to 7:00 p.m. for those interested. In October the dates are the 13th and the 27th. Terrific Tuesdays are free and open to all members, friends, and community members.



Adult RE World Religions

In conjunction with the middle schoolers' "Neighboring Faiths" studies, we will be offering a separate adult RE World Religions discussion group, and the adults will be invited to join the middle schoolers when they visit other churches.

The adult RE discussion group will be held on **Friday evenings**, at the church, once a month, October through April. They will be centered around the corresponding chapters from Huston Smith's book *The World's Religions* (one chapter each month, but not in the order in which they are written). This will be a drop-in group so you can attend only the sessions that you are interested in. Although reading the corresponding chapter will not be required, I highly recommend that anyone attending these discussions purchase this text and read the appropriate chapters. This is not a lecture series, but rather a discussion group, and you will get a lot more out of it if you do the readings. Sessions will consist of opening words, about a 10-minute video clip of Huston Smith talking about the corresponding religious faith, and a small group discussion. I will also provide fact sheets from the chapters and suggested questions to help keep the material fresh. Please let me know if you are interested in attending (some or most) sessions so I can get an idea regarding space requirements.

The first session will be held on October 9 from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. This discussion will be about Judaism (Chapter 7 in Huston Smith's book). Subsequent discussions will likely be held on the second Friday of each month, but a definitive schedule will be announced later. The basic schedule is as follows:

- October – Judaism
- November – Christianity
- December – Confucianism and Taoism
- January – Buddhism
- February – Hinduism
- March – Islam
- April – The Primal Religions (and possibly Baha'i)

As field trips are scheduled, I will post the dates.

In conjunction with the October discussion on Judaism, we will be visiting Congregation Emanuel (830 W. Moreland Blvd. Waukesha), on October 16, for their evening service. Details on car-pooling, etc. will follow later. Note that the middle schoolers taking the "Neighboring Faiths" class will also be attending the service on the 16th.

NWEI "Exploring Deep Ecology" Course This Fall

The Green Sanctuary Committee will be hosting a North West Earth Institute course at LCUUC on "Exploring Deep Ecology," beginning **Sunday, October 18** at 11:45 a.m. This course consists of nine hour-long sessions to discuss readings from the course book, which contains a diverse collection of essays, articles, and book excerpts organized around weekly themes to promote lively discussion. This book will cost \$20. The discussion group will meet every other week, with breaks around the holidays: Sundays Oct. 18, Nov. 1, 15, 29, Dec. 13, Jan. 3, 17, 31, and Feb 14.

"Exploring Deep Ecology" is a course for addressing core values and how they affect the way we view and treat the Earth. Its goals are: to clarify earth-related values through discussions about Exploring Deep Ecology; to discover how personal values affect the way we view and treat the earth; and to understand what it means to take personal responsibility for the earth.
