REVEREND MATT'S MUSINGS: The Time is Now

Hello Beloveds,

I'm writing this month's musing from the Target Center in Minneapolis, where I'm gathered with other UU ministers from around the country and many local residents, waiting for a rally to begin in protest of the ongoing immigration enforcement presence in this community. Organizers, clergy, and thousands of supporters have come together in response to a surge in federal immigration actions that has drawn national attention and mobilized widespread demonstrations.

The reports from the region are heartbreaking, and the pain experienced by local families and neighbors is real. Faith leaders from across the country were invited here to **bear witness and learn from the deep resistance and organizing taking place**. The decision to convene this gathering was made just days ago, and nearly a thousand clergy and advocates arrived from places as far away as Anchorage, San Diego, Vermont, and Atlanta. What has unfolded is a fully organized

movement—with coordinated logistics, home hospitality, charter buses, and food for all—that is garnering national and international attention.

Faith leaders from across the country were invited here to bear witness and learn from the deep resistance and organizing taking place.

The only way this is possible—truly the **ONLY** way—is because relationships have been built over many years among diverse groups. This is precisely why our Social Action Committee has been partnering so closely with organizations like SOPHIA, Voces de la Frontera, MICAH, and others. Their long-term justice work has been vital, but even more important are the **trusting relationships cultivated along the way**. It is these relationships that activate in moments of crisis and help protect our communities.

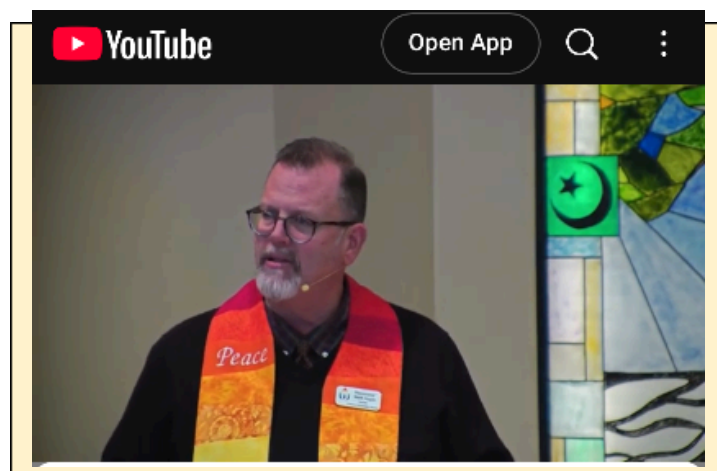
I am honored to support their efforts and to serve as your minister in these challenging times.

Mark Your Calendar: April 7 Elections



April 7 may feel a long way off, but it's never too early to keep voting on the radar. Local and statewide elections shape our courts, schools, and communities in ways that reach far beyond Election Day.

The ACLU reminds us that voting is one of the most powerful ways to protect democracy. When participation drops, decisions are made by fewer voices, often leaving the most vulnerable communities without representation.

So no need to set your alarm just yet—but do plan to **vote on April 7**, and help make sure every voice counts.

Community Minister's Corner

I'd like to offer a quick overview of what makes the sound and video happen for a Sunday service.

In that wooden cabinet at the back of the sanctuary lives the mixing board, the heart of the sound system. It has connections for 24 separate sound sources, each adjustable for volume, highs and lows, stereo left to right, and reverb. Those 24 channels combine to become the sound you hear from the speakers on the ceiling. Speaking of hearing the service, did you know we have an assisted listening system? Radio receivers and headphones are available at the sanctuary entrance for anyone who could use a little volume boost. Ask an usher for help if needed.

It takes training and practice to become a sound tech, starting with selecting the right microphone. The style most often used is a wireless headset microphone and transmitter, the size of a raisin, that sits alongside the speaker's cheek. This lets you move freely while avoiding feedback—a problem common with old corded microphones. Thanks to better training and equipment, feedback is now rare.



The sound tech follows a prepared script to know when to turn mics on or off. Only microphones in use are on, creating cleaner sound and reducing feedback. This requires careful attention to follow every cue.

Next to the sound booth sits the Zoom technician and camera operator, who manage the Zoom call, camera, and recording software. They follow the same script as the sound tech, changing camera angles and zooms, and sharing Zoom participants' Joys and Concerns to the candle table. The recording is edited and uploaded to LCUUC's YouTube channel, where over 60 services are ready to watch. Search "Lake Country Unitarian Universalist Church" to view by date or in playlists like Holidays and Celebrations, New to UU, and Guest Speakers.

In closing, **we could use more sound and video technicians.** It's fun to work with this technology and help share the minister's message with a larger audience. Contact me or Tracy Moraine if you'd like to learn more.

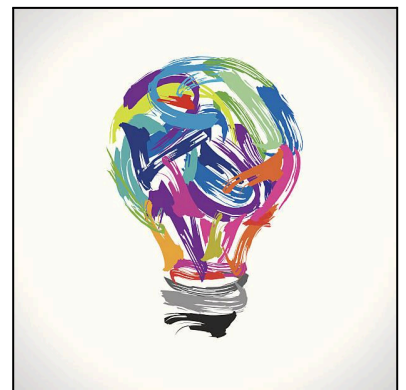

One of our obligations as the Board was to review and approve the charters of our various committees. This year, all committees completed charters that clarify their purpose, goals, and activities, helping them stay aligned with the congregation's mission, attract volunteers, and clearly communicate their work to the community.

This year, you will also be hearing more about the Healthy Relationships Team. When conflicts arise in our membership, this team's purpose will be twofold:
